Goals of Chapin Elementary School

Climate Performance Goal:

Math Performance Goal:

Using MAP assessment, the percentage of students in grades 2-5 that meet or exceed their target growth goal in math will increase by 10% points.

Strategies:

- Strengthen math instruction through the appropriate use of Everyday Math for students in grades KG 5th.
- * Provide differentiated instructional methods to improve achievement of students with varied learning styles and abilities.
- Accelerate disabled and subsidized lunch student learning in order to meet/exceed grade level standards and AYP
- * Implement horizontal and vertical collaboration within the school and among other schools in the Chapin cluster.

ELA Performance Goal:

Using Dominie Text level assessment, 100% of the students will demonstrate and/or exceed growth in reading levels. Students currently reading at grade level will show a 1.0 increase in growth for every 1.0 years of instruction. Students below grade level will accelerate at a rate of 1.5 for every 1.0 years of instruction.

Strategies:

- Implement an extensive writing curriculum that incorporates best practices.
- Provide students with instruction in test taking strategies and support/tutorial services based on identified weaknesses.
- Implement horizontal and vertical collaboration within the school and among other schools in the Chapin cluster
- * Provide differentiated instructional methods to improve achievement of students with varied learning styles and abilities.
- * Accelerate disabled and subsidized lunch student learning in order to meet/exceed grade level standards and AYP.

Teacher Quality Performance Goal:

Staff effectiveness, as measured by teacher responses on the NSDC survey, will increase by 2% each year.

Strategies:

- Research and implement the components of a professional learning community.
- Provide research based/best practice staff development to enhance student learning and achievement.
- * Demonstrate technology competencies.
- * Review and analyze student assessment data in established data teams.
