CrossRoads will be a place where children are cherished and challenged.





Strategies


- We will develop activities and assessment that promote student gains in reading, writing and mathematics among all subgroups.





Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) Virtual Comparison Group Data 2017




MATH 2017

ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR 2017-2018

- CrossRoads students continue to perform significantly higher than other students in the state on SCPASS/SC READY and substantially exceed the performance of their peers nationally on MAP.
- S'Ade Glenn was named Teacher of the Year at CRIS and Christina Gardiner was named Support Employee of the Year.
- The CrossRoads STEAM model went to whole school implementation with 100% student participation.
- 1:1 Chromebook technology initiative fully implemented
- Growth of our after-school program to include tutoring help from certified teachers and an emphasis on a variety of physical activities.
- Teachers collaborated in data teams, using student performance data on both summative and formative assessments to plan instruction.
- Teachers differentiated instruction in the four content areas based on results from the fall administration of NWEA's MAP assessment.
- Twenty-nine teachers have earned National Board Certification.
- CrossRoads received a School Report Card Absolute Rating of Excellent and an Improvement Rating of Excellent.
- Our band, chorus, and strings continue to perform well and earn superior ratings in regional and national competitions.
- STEM students recognized in local, state, and national media for innovative and lifechanging programs.
- PRIDE and Ladies of Integrity programs which target and provide support for at-risk students in place.
- Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) earned Ribbon Status and a SET Evaluation rating of 100%.
- The CrossRoads Beta Club was recognized nationally and earned the Gold Key Award (Growing Opportunities for Leadership Development). They earned this because they increased by 10% participation in the SC Junior Beta Club Convention.
- Triage Program A holistic student support system, designed to create a continuum of care throughout students' initial, middle-school year. The goal of our Triage Program is to create an inclusive, collaborative partnership with the sole purpose of serving the whole child. One must link the academic, social and interpersonal components of each child in order to address/serve that child's particular needs.
