Initiatives & Strategies for School Improvement

Mobile Technology Dutch Fork High School shares District Five's belief in providing students with the 21st century tools and skills they need to support their learning and to prepare them for postsecondary education and the real world. Currently, full-time teachers and students have Chromebooks. Students can use a district issued device or bring their own device. Additionally, a full-time Digital Integration Specialist (DIS) and five Technology Teacher Leaders (TTLs) work collaboratively with students and staff to offer education, training and support.

Professional Learning Community PLCs are groups of teachers who meet regularly to use student assessment data to make instructional and curricular decisions. PLC's examine patterns and trends in student learning, establish specific learning goals and timelines for curriculum delivery and assessment, facilitate analysis that results in action and maintain continuous improvement cycles. The ultimate goal of PLC's at DFHS is to create a self-sustaining, collaborative culture emphasizing continuous academic improvement for all students.

PBIS is a proactive school-wide approach to discipline. Supports include established behavioral expectations, explicit instruction on those expectations, positive reinforcement for desired behaviors, and consistent consequences for behavioral infractions. Faculty and staff teach and acknowledge respectful, responsible, and reputable behavior.

"Level Up" Tutoring DFHS offers free tutoring services for all grade levels in all major contents. In addition we have a testing center for students who need to take test. Students have the opportunity to get free tutoring Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 4-6 pm.




Dutch Fork High School reclaims 5A State Championship in football

111 School District Five students awarded academic honors from College Board National Recognition Programs

— 111 Lexington-Richland School District Five students have earned academic honors from the College Board National Recognition Programs. These National Recognition Programs grant underrepresented students with academic honors that can be included on college and scholarship applications and connect students with universities across the country, helping them meaningfully connect to colleges and stand out during the admissions process. Colleges and scholarship programs identify students awarded National African American, Hispanic, Indigenous and/or Rural/Small Town Recognition through College Board's Student Search Service.

"We're thrilled that so many of our students have earned this recognition. We are very proud of them for their achievements in their classrooms and on College Board assessments," said School District Five Chief of Academics and Administration Anna Miller. "These programs help students from underrepresented backgrounds stand out to colleges and universities during the admissions process."

Students who may be eligible have a GPA of 3.5 or higher and have excelled on the PSAT/ NMSQT or PSAT 10, or earned a score of 3 or higher on two or more AP Exams.





The STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) program at DFHS is an honors magnet program that accelerates and enriches learning experiences for students who are academically gifted in and have an interest in a STEM related major and career. Students are accepted into the program based on their standardized test scores, middle school teachers' recommendations, and interest in STEM related fields. Since 2005, our program has been a local answer to the national STEM initiative. Presently there are over 280 students in the program from the ninth through the twelfth grades.

THE PURPOSE OF STEM IS TO:

- accelerate traditional curriculum to allow students to take more STEM related courses
- promote inquiry style learning across the curriculum
- provide unique opportunities in and out of the classroom
- develop literacy in STEM disciplines
- promote a learning community which extends beyond the school

STEM accelerates learning experiences enabling them to pursue AP and Honors courses, research, and/or internships in their field(s) of interest. The curriculum for STEM students is designed to accommodate the interests and abilities of the individual while integrating the STEM principles.

Upon completion of the STEM program, students are highly qualified for admission in the most rigorous and competitive university programs. Those students meeting the requirements will be recognized at graduation and receive the STEM program designation for recommendations and applications for colleges and scholarships.

DFHS STEM Honors Academic Magnet program was ranked 25th best in the nation by Newsweek, our STEM program is open to qualifying rising 9th graders from any school.
