- ▼ RSES teachers continued their professional study and implementation of the Lucy Calkins
  Writing Units of Study and Reading Units of Study. During the 2016-2017 school year our
  teachers with the support of our school's Reading Coach began planning how to integrate the
  reading and writing units so the language and content is consistent during the English Language
  Arts Block.
- ▼ Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) continues to bring a positive commitment to following school-wide expectations at RSES. Teachers acknowledge our students with Gator Slips on a daily basis for positive behavior. New additions have been added to our teacher-led Gator Events to continue to engage our students towards making good choices. Our students know their GATOR Goals and strive to do their personal best each and every day!
- ✓ Using data to drive our decision making is a focus at RSES. Our teachers continue to use the Data Team Process to help guide the instructional decisions they make to influence student achievement. Teachers focus on research-based common instructional strategies and activities to help students reach the goal of academic success. Celebrations are occurring daily due to the growth our teachers and students are seeing while utilizing the Data Team Process.
- ✓ During the 2016-2017 school year, we began our work towards creating math workshop in kindergarten through fifth grade. Utilizing the support of our district math coordinator, our team of teachers began slowly structuring an environment to support math workshop. Once the environment was established, teachers started to use differentiated activities to support the math standards for the grade level. With the addition of math workshop, it is observed that student engagement has increased across the school.
