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School Summary Report 2022-2023

School History

In 1923, a new Mullins High School was created under the principalship of Mr. L. B. McCormick, who later served as District Superintendent from 1926 to 1948. In 1936 and 1937 respectfully, the school was updated with the addition of more classrooms and a gymnasium. By 1937, the high school enrollment had grown to about 350 students and the school became one of the state's first high schools to be accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. Mullins High School remains South Carolina's oldest continuous member of this prestigious accrediting agency. In 1971 Palmetto High School and Mullins High School merged to form one public high school for the Mullins area. It was decided that the newly formed high school would be called Mullins High School. Following a fire in 1976, the school operated from a location on Academy Street, using numerous portable classrooms until a new school could be constructed. In 1981, the present building was completed on a beautiful 84-acre campus in West Mullins.
