At Britton's Neck Elementary our goal is to ensure that all students, surrounded by high expectations and a safe, caring environment, reach their full potential. Everyone has worked diligently this year to ensure that we are meeting this goal. High achievement for all subgroups is our focus. Students, teachers, parents and community members have partnered together to ensure each student reaches his or her full potential and that we are progressing towards meeting the performance goals included in the school strategic plan. While we realize there is room for improvement, we are proud of the gains we have made this year.

Our theme for this year was "Attitude Determines Altitude!" We have stressed the importance of attitude in achieving goals and successes. Our goal this year has been to increase student achievement and help our students prepare for college and career readiness. With full-school implementation of the SC College and Career Standards, professional development activities and the work of teachers have been focused throughout the year on aligning standards and instructional practices to ensure appropriate rigor in our classrooms. Teachers met weekly in grade level data teams and bi-monthly school-wide PLCs to create common assessments, plan rigorous standards-based instruction, analyze student performance data and increase their knowledge of effective, research-based instructional practices. On-going data analysis allowed teachers to determine students' progress and needs at any given time during the year. This information was then used to differentiate instruction, providing additional support or acceleration as needed.

This year we used Title I funds to employ a full-time Curriculum Facilitator. Her responsibilities included providing professional development, planning with teachers, modeling instruction, observing and providing feedback to teachers, and leading the data analysis process. While her work was focused on ELA and Math, the Curriculum Facilitator supported teachers in all curriculum areas. We also received state funding for a full-time Reading Coach. She has provided on-going support for our teachers in implementing the Balanced Literacy Model.

We also implemented Positive Behavior Intervention Systems (PBIS) this year. The SOAR theme was used to develop our school-wide matrix of behavioral expectations. Expectations were established to help students be successful, orderly, accountable, and respectful in common areas of the school. Specific behaviors were taught to students and reinforced continuously. Students who displayed appropriate behaviors had an opportunity to earn "Eagle Bucks" which could be redeemed for various awards.

Parents are valued assets who partner with teachers to increase student learning. This year we have worked to strengthen family involvement by sponsoring various programs such as Title I/Curriculum Night, Family Story Night, Math-Science Night, Father-Daughter Dance, Mother-Son Night, Goodies for Grandparents, Pastries for Parents, and Family Fun Fitness Night.

With the support of all stakeholders, we will continue striving to provide the highest quality of education to the students of Britton's Neck Elementary. We remain committed to exploring ways in which education can be made more rigorous and meaningful for each student, while fostering positive personal relationships and holding high expectations.

Our Achievements:

- Received a Lowes grant of \$2400 to provide field trips and instructional supplies
- Target Grant of \$700 for field trips
- 5th Grade received a grant from Patriots Point for blended learning activities as well as science and social studies texts
- Standardized test scores higher than those of schools like ours in all subject areas
- Partnership with Duke Energy and RIF provided each 2nd grade classroom with a set of 35 multicultural hardback books and 8 books for each student to take home
