Improvement Results:

Britton's Neck Elementary School shows continuous progress toward increasing student achievement. In the spring of 2016, students in grades 3-5 were tested using SCREA-DY in English Language Arts (ELA) and Math. This was a new state test being used in these subject areas. Students in grades 4-5 were tested using SCPASS in Science and Social Studies. The table below shows the percent of BNES students who exceeded or met on these state assessments in 2015 and 2016.
