#### MEMS School Plan 2015-2016

4th grade By the 2016 state assessment, Reading scores in 4th grade will decrease in need of support from 39 to 21 students, increase close from 18 to 28 students, increase ready from 13 to 22 students, and maintain exceeding at 8 students.

5th grade By the 2016 state assessment, Reading scores in 5th grade will maintain in need of support at 32 students, maintain close at 32 students, maintain ready at 12 students, and maintain exceeding at 4 students.

6th grade By the 2016 state assessment, Reading scores in 6th grade will decrease in need of support from 24 to 18 students, increase close from 18 to 21 students, increase ready from 2 to 5 students, and maintain exceeding at 3 students.

7th grade By the 2016 state assessment, Reading scores in 7th grade will decrease in need of support from 31 to 25 students, increase close from 25 to 29 students, increase ready from 8 to 11 students, and maintain exceeding at 4 students.

8th grade By the 2016 state assessment, Reading scores in 8th grade will decrease in need of support from 33 to 31 students, decrease close from 22 to 21 students, increase ready from 11 to 13 students, and increase exceeding from 0 to 1 student.



### **Strategies for Improvement:**

- 1. All teachers provided interventions for struggling students weekly.
- 2. All teachers participated in TAP clusters to improve teacher effectiveness.
- 3. Grades 6—8 utilized a revised exploratory schedule in order to allow students to supplement their reading instruction through participation in the Read180 program.
- 4. Administrators and the Curriculum Coach held data meetings and conferences with identified teachers.





### **Action Plan for**

2015-2016

For the 2016-2017 school year, SCTAP will focus on student strategies for reading and student data to improve overall student achievement. Standardized testing data from the 2015-2016 school year will be analyzed at the beginning of the school year to determine the area of greatest need in grade level bands. Teachers will complete an individualized Student Learning Outcome Plan that will focus specifically on an area of need within their class based on testing data. Teachers will be required to keep documentation of student progress towards the goal set.

McColl Elementary Middle School will continue the implementation of:

- Read 180 in grades 6 through 8 to improve reading comprehension and provide exposure to informational text.
- Accelerated Reader in grades K through 8 to motivate students to read, improve their reading comprehension, and advance their reading levels.
- Teachers will identify struggling students in their class and provide individualized interventions on a weekly basis.
- Periodic data meetings will be held with teachers. The purpose of these meetings will be to analyze data, set goals, reflect, and foster an environment where data is valued and used to drive instruction.
