

Multiculturalism and Diversity

In honor of Black History Month, students and staff celebrated with a series of events. This year's theme was "Knowledge is Power". Students received a moment in Black History each day, and had three spirit days to honor the culture. In culmination of the month's festivities a program was held with students highlighting the growth and achievements of African Americans.

Accomplishments

- JROTC Blood Drives—The JROTC, in collaboration with the Teacher Cadet Program and Interact club, hosted five American Red Cross Blood drives during SY 2017-2018 collecting more than 162 units of blood this year. Our students are saving lives!
- JROTC—On November 29, 2017 the MCHS Army JROTC stood its formal inspection conducted by the US Army Cadet Command. The unit achieved a score of 95.1% designating the MCHS JROTC as an Honor Unit with Distinction. This places our Army JROTC in the top 15% of the 1,730 Army JROTC units world-wide!
- Testing—MCHS students continue to make gains on the EOC Exams for Algebra 1, Biology 1, English 1, and US History. Students in their third year of high school participated in the SAT, ACT and the Ready to Work (R2W) Career Assessment.
- STEM Premier—MCHS students participated in this new program which requires each student to access the internet to begin creating an online digital profile that can connect them to colleges and corporations across the US.
- Technology— Three new computer labs were equipped and all classrooms have Smart Boards and laptops. All desktop computers were replaced with new technology. A new pathways to college computer lab was created in the Media Center for seniors.
- The football and volleyball teams both made the SCHS League playoffs. Noah Henderson signed a Division 1 LOI to play football with East Carolina University. Elijah Blair, Bulldog Jr. quarterback, won the state strength meet in the 205 lb. weight class. The MCHS football team received a \$500 grant from USA Football and \$15,000 worth of free equipment from the Carolina Panthers. Ryan DuPree, Quandaveon McCollum and Kennedy Ashwood all were named to the All-State High School Sports Report Team. Joey McCray and Noah Henderson were picked and played in the touchstone Energy North-South All-Star game. Coach Dean Boyd was named Region VII AAAA Athletic Director of the Year!
