Performance Goal I: The percentage of students who score Level 2 or higher on the Algebra I EOC assessment will increase from 67.4% in 2017 to 74.4% in 2023.

Performance Goal II: The percentage of students who score Level 3 or higher on the Algebra I EOC assessment will increase from 23.6% in 2017 to 38.1% in 2023.

Performance Goal III: The percentage of students who score Level 2 or higher on the English I EOC assessment will increase from 62.8% in 2017 to 71.3% in 2023.

Performance Goal IV: The percentage of students who score Level 3 or higher on the English I EOC assessment will increase from 37.8% in 2017 to 47.8% in 2023.

Performance Goal XI: The percentage of students satisfied with the learning environment will increase from an average of 68.8% in 2017 to 75.3% in 2023.


Performance Goal XII: The percentage of students satisfied with the social and physical environment will increase from 72% in 2017 to 81% in 2023.


Performance Goal XIII: The percentage of parents who feel welcome at MCHS will be maintained from 96.46% in 2017 to 97.71% in 2023.

2016-2017 & 2017-2018 Awards & Accomplishments

- Scholarship money awarded to seniors totaled \$3,964,894.
- Of 164 graduates, 69 graduates received completer certificates from the Newberry County Career Center, 102 graduates earned a Newberry County Advanced Diploma, 20 graduates were named as Newberry County School District Honor Graduates, 7 graduates earned the South Carolina Academic Honors Award, 23 graduates were inducted into the National Technical Honor Society, graduates earned a total of 900 dual credit hours for transfer credit towards college degrees, 8 Palmetto Fellows recipients earned a potential scholarship total of \$230,400 towards a four year Bachelor's Degree, 40 students earned a 3.0 or better and ranked in the top 30% of their class with a potential LIFE scholarship total of \$920,000 towards a four year Bachelor's Degree, and 60 students met the 3.0 requirement that qualifies a student for the HOPE scholarship with a potential HOPE scholarship total of \$600,000 towards a four year Bachelor's Degree.
- A teacher was invited to present and share expert knowledge to college professors, fellow educators, and representatives serving in our state government at the 2017 South Carolina Association of Teacher Educators Conference
- The MCHS Media Assistant was recognized in the fall edition of the South Carolina Association of School Librarians' professional journal, The Media Center Messenger.
- Mid-Carolina High School had an excellent year. In 2017 we continued to post high achievement in our high school graduation rate, end of course assessment passage rate, ACT scores, SAT Scores, and Advanced Placement test scores. Two MCHS students were chosen as 2016 NEC Youth Tour Winners.
- Mid-Carolina High School's Counseling Department and Link Crew hosted its 10th Annual Freshmen Orientation.
- MCHS hosted an Open House.
- The MCHS Guidance Department hosted several workshops throughout the school year.
