The administration and School Improvement Council prepare this summary of our goals and achievements as well as take the opportunity to share our successes with our school community. West-Oak Middle School welcomes and encourages the suggestions of our teachers, students, parents, and community.



Warriors Path to Success: Programs and Initiatives

- Beta Club WOMS Inducted twenty-eight new members into Beta Club while Beta Club members completed over 550 hours of service to the local community this year. Our Beta Club also collected over 700 shoes to be donated for the Soles 4 Souls program benefiting impoverished people around the world.
- FCA (Fellowship of Christian Athletes) The FCA Huddle group meets every Thursday morning averaging ninety students in attendance each week. This is the second year for our FCA leadership program of nineteen students who were committed to leading our students. This year the FCA sponsored a spirit week and collected over 600 cans of food with a \$500 donation to Dot's Kitchen. The huddle group has great support from the Foothills FCA and local churches. FCA would like to thank Foothills Community Church, Life Point Church, Westminster Baptist, and Calvary Church of God for their support with food and speakers on a weekly basis.
- FFA (Future Farmers of America) The WOMS FFA was recognized this past year at the National Convention in Indianapolis for being a Gold Chapter because of their extra hard work in our school and community. They continued to make a difference in Westminster by participating in Ag Days at the Heritage Fair and collecting 1400 pairs of socks to donate to the local homeless shelter.
- Field Trips Each grade went to the Roper Mountain Science Center to participate in their STEM programs. The 7th & 8th grade went to Charleston, SC for 3 days this April visiting historic sights and learn about the ecosystem in the low country. The 6th Grade took a day trip to Atlanta to visit the Georgia Aquarium, Atlanta Zoo, and Medieval Times. The Band and Chorus took students to Orlando for a music competition while also visiting Universal Studios and ride a river boat.
- Principal's Luncheons Principal's Luncheons encourage students to strive for excellence and earn the opportunity to
 attend a meal at a local restaurant if they maintain a 93 or higher in each of their courses. Luncheons were held at the
 conclusion of each academic quarter.
- Reading Campaign In November, we hosted a Fall Fun Fest to support reading literacy. During the evening, we passed out books, played literacy games, and served hotdogs to 259 students and their families. During the spring semester, our 6th and 7th grade students were challenged to keep a tally of their books they read with "Be at 3, Strive for 5, Great at 8, Win with 10, or Many at 20" while 8th grade students travelled virtually down Route 66 counting the pages they read as they traveled. During this reading campaign, 393 students qualified for the February Challenge to complete 3 books, 327 students qualified for the March Challenge of reading 5 books. As of April, 6th grade has read 1,162 books, 7th grade read 1,149 books, and 8th grade students have read 368,918 miles/pages. Our goal is to have 85% of students meet their reading goals and be invited to the participate in the Reading Celebration in May.
- Safety and Security Several safety and security improvements were made to our campus including plexiglass in the main office, new signage for the building and parking areas to direct emergency vehicles, and a handicap ramp with fencing to the PE field.
- Student Council The WOMS StuCo has worked hard again this year to support our teachers and students with two Spirit Weeks, the Twelve Days 'till Christmas Break Countdown, Red Ribbon Week, the student Spring Dance, Teacher Appreciation Week, selling hot chocolate, and cleaning up the downtown area for Earth Day. This organization is student-led by student officers leading monthly meetings and heading up committees to make decisions and plan activities for our student body.
- Students of the Month Each month we recognize eighteen students who have stood out with excellence in their classes and recognize them in the monthly newsletter and announce their name over the intercom.
- The Oak Radio Station New this year is the Oak 87.9 FM is a short-wave radio station for parents to tune into while dropping off or picking up students on campus to hear the latest news. Announcements are pre-recorded by students weekly. The radio station is in addition to our frequently updated Facebook page and Monthly Newsletters with the goal of finding more ways to communicate what is going on at WOMS with parents and community members.
- W3 Incentives This year at WOMS, we rewarded students who completed their goals by turning in all assignments halfway through each quarter and passing all core classes called W3 for Warrior Work Week with an extended recess, fun activities, and delicious treats. The W3 also allowed extra time and assistance for students needing to work on missing assignments or pull up grades each quarter.
