School History

West End School was established as a separate unit of the Easley Public Schools in 1922. In 1929, the wooden building was replaced with a two-story brick structure which was used until the present school, located at the intersection of Highways 8 and 135, opened in the fall of 1985. A new wing was added in 2004. The present enrollment is 730 students in kindergarten (K4 and K5) through grade 5. West End personnel includes 2 administrators, 54 certified staff members, and 32 support staff members.

- The school-wide positive discipline plan (PBIS Program) and character education programs continue to be expanded.
