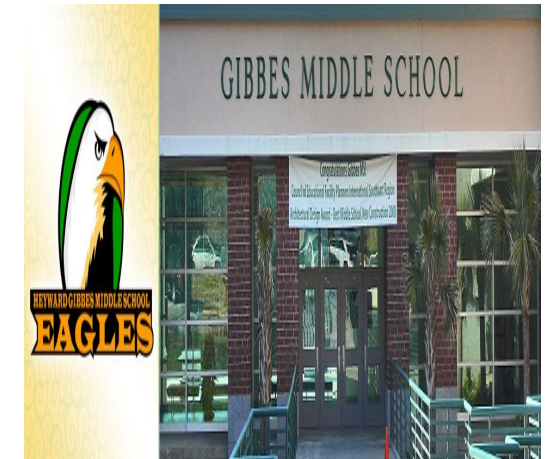
Our mission is to establish and provide a supportive learning environment where our students are challenged and nurtured to become self-reflective, life-long learners.

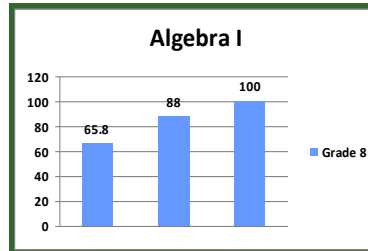
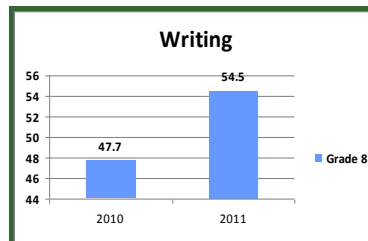
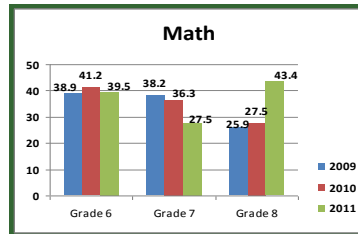
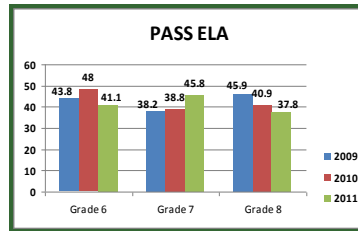
School Improvement Goals
