Our Mission

The mission of Carver-Lyon Elementary School is to provide a foundation for each student to develop his/her maximum potential for lifelong learning in a safe, nurturing environment with active community involvement.

History of Carver-Lyon Elementary

In August of 1999, two elementary schools were combined to form the current Carver-Lyon Elementary School. The first principal of the Carver-Lyon Elementary School was Dr. M. Diane James.

Carver Elementary School was named for Dr. George Washington Carver, noted black scientist. The school was elected in 1938 to take the place of the old Leevy Grade School, located on the same site. Carver first served elementary grades 1-3 and junior high grades 7-8. From 1945-1949, even high school students, grades 9-12 were served here. The facility housed as many as 1,300 students, using several portable classrooms and served as an extension of C.A. Johnson High School.

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Our School Today

Currently, our enrollment is 395 students from CD—5th grade. Dr. LeConte' Middleton serves as our dynamic principal and believes in educating the whole child by recognizing and focusing on their academic strengths and leadership potential. There are approximately 40 classroom teachers and 20 support staff members.

Our Goals and Strategies



Each year, every S.C. public school must determine goals for a renewal or improvement plan. Carver-Lyon's goals and progress for 2010-2011 are:
