## School Renewal Plan Goals for 2011-12

## Student Academic Achievement

1. The percentage of students in grades 2-5 who meet or exceed their MAP Reading growth target will increase 10\% during 2011-12.

Progress: The amount of students who met or exceeded their growth target in reading rose from $45.2 \%$ to $48.4 \%$. There was growth here, but we still have more to do!
2. The percentage of students in grades 2-5 who meet or exceed their MAP Math growth target will increase 10\% during 2011-12.
Progress: The percentage meeting or exceeding the target showed a decrease from $55.4 \%$ to $53.2 \%$. Some grades made progress, but others did not. We will focus on areas of need to ensure ALL students grow.
3. The amount of students in grades 3-5 who score Met or Exemplary on PASS science will increase 10\% per year.
Progress: The amount of students meeting the standard went from $51.4 \%$ in 2010 to $51.6 \%$ in 2011. There was no decrease, but we did not see significant growth, either. We must continue to improve science instruction.
4. The number of students in grades 3-5 who score Met or Exemplary on PASS social studies will grow 10\% per year.
Progress: The number of students who scored Met or Exemplary fell from $70.4 \%$ in 2010 to $60.8 \%$ in 2011. We will continue to devote additional resources to social studies.
5. The percentage of students who are promoted to the next grade will rise two percent from 2010 to 2011.
Progress: The percentage of students promoted in 2011 rose to $97.5 \%$ from $95.7 \%$ in 2010. This is a significant improvement for our students, but we want to reach 100\%!

## Staff Preparation

6. 100\% of teachers at Watkins-Nance are highly qualified.
7. $100 \%$ of staff members will undergo some form of evaluation to ensure their continued fitness as educators.
Progress: All of our teachers this year are highly qualified, and all of our staff members are subject to evaluation.

## Home-School Connection

8. The percentage of Watkins-Nance teachers indicating satisfaction with home-school relations will increase $10 \%$ each year.
9. The percentage of Watkins-Nance parents who are satisfied with the physical and social environment of the school will grow by $10 \%$ each year.
Progress: Teacher satisfaction with homeschool relations went from $89.7 \%$ in 2010 to $70.6 \%$ in 2011. The number of parents who are satisfied with our social and physical environment similarly fell from $95.7 \%$ to $78.9 \%$. We will continue our efforts in these areas.

## Early Childhood

10. The percentage of students scoring Competent Emergent on the Comprehension portion of the ELSA will increase $19 \%$ per year.
11. The percentage of Watkins-Nance students scoring at or above grade level on the Dominie assessment will increase 10.4\% per year.
Progress: Those students scoring Competent Emergent on ELSA rose from $22 \%$ to 58\% from 2010 to 2011-a fantastic jump. Students meeting the standard on Dominie dropped from $57.9 \%$ to $53.0 \%$ from 2010 to 2011. We made great progress, but we still have some areas of concern.
