Spring Valley High is a 450,000 sq. ft. state-of-the-art facility serving a diverse student body of over 2000 students. We have cutting-edge technology, science and fine arts labs designed for specific content and exceptional athletic facilities. In addition to comprehensive and CATE programs, our school houses three schools-within-aschool: magnet math and science programs, a freshman academy and an Arts in Basic Curriculum Program. Our science and math magnet program students won over 60 awards for science research. Our Math/Mock Trial Teams were successful in State Competitions. Our senior class had four National Merit Finalists, 39 High School League Scholar Athletes, 28 Palmetto Fellows, 30 SC Academic Honor Graduates, 89 Hope Scholarships and 115 Life Scholarship recipients. The Senior Class earned \$33,526,756 in scholarships, 61.9% of the seniors received a scholarship. Eleven athletic teams won Region Championships, our Girls Basketball Team were State Runners-up and our Boys Tennis Team won the State Championship. This year Spring Valley began implementing High Schools That Work and the World Language Interim Performance Assessment as well as continued the Smaller Learning Communities, Viking Way and Drop-Out Prevention Programs.

Magnet Program Explorations: A four-year college-preparatory program with an emphasis on the science, mathematics, and communication skills needed to compete in the technological career areas of the future. Students will produce individual and group projects that integrate the four areas, as well as exploring in depth several technological fields including forensic science. Explorations students will also complete 200 hours in the Intership Program during their senior year.

Discovery Program: A four-year Honors/AP program designed for students withmotivation, interest, aptitude and commitment to academic excellence. Student participants investigate both theory and application over a broad range of academics and engage in, under the guidance of a school or community mentor, individualized laboratory-based research in a specific area of their own interest. Honrs and Advanced Placement courses are offered in all academic areas, with distinctive opportunities in the fields of science and mathematics. Program participants also explore Honors/AP level courses in literature and history with Honors/AP options in drama, art, language, and music.
