Collaborative efforts of our parents and faculty resulted in continuous improvements for our students during the 2018-2019 school year. "We Expect Success" in the four A's -- Academics, Arts, Activities, and Athletics. Additionally, business and community partners provided internship and shadowing opportunities for many students. The collective efforts of our parents, students, and staff continue to make Ridge View's personalized learning tradition a place where every student can experience success; and we are continuing to make premier strides in the four A's. Successes in the following areas include:

Academics

- ♦ AiMs Magnet and Blazer Academy designed our first Annual Impact Day. The theme: Influence Many, Provide Aid, Change Together. 400 freshmen volunteered in the community.
- ♦ Scholars Academy Magnet for Business and Law Magnet & the Institute of Health Sciences Magnet earned a School of Distinction Award from the Magnet Schools of America.
- Students enrolled in the AVID Early College program have an opportunity to earn an associate degree from the University of South Carolina Sumter while still in high school without paying tuition.
- ♦ In partnership with Claffin University and Midlands Technical College, 61 students enrolled in Dual Credit courses.
- ♦ 520 Advanced Placement exams administered. 42 AP Scholars
- ♦ Ridge View High School Economics Challenge teams placed second and third in the SC state final competition.

Activities

- Principal, Dr. Mack-Foxworth, received the 2019 Secretary of Defense Employer Support Freedom award, the highest recognition given by U.S Government to employers for their outstanding support of employees serving in the National Guard and Reserve.
- Winter Wishes, one of Ridge View's school-wide community service project exceeded their goals by raising \$2,000 for PAALS, donating over 2,000 toiletries to Sistercare and 13,128 canned good items to Harvest Hope Food Bank, and providing holiday gifts to 77 foster children.
- Student Council was recognized as a 2019 National Gold Council of Excellence for the 12th consecutive year.
- Student Body President Otiana Thompson was honored by joining the Terry McCoy Hall of Fame. Sophomore Class President Yazmine Latimore was elected as the District 4 Vice Chair.

Arts

- Fine Arts students performed on Facebook Live to promote and thank the Arts in Basic Curriculum and SC legislators for supporting the fine arts.
- 17 Band students were selected for the Region band. Alijah Norris will also represent Ridge View in the All-State Band.
- 15 Chorus members were selected for the All-State Chorus and had the opportunity to sing at several statewide events, including the one at Winthrop University.
- ♦ The Advanced Chorus received a Superior with Distinction, the highest rating possible, at the Concert Performance Assessment (CPA).
- English 1 students participated in a Romeo & Juliet residency with artist Buren Martin. Students performed the Shakespearean play for the freshmen class.

Athletics

- Girls Basketball Coach Terrance Gibson is selected as a North-South All-Star Coach for 2019.
- Varsity Basketball player, Malcolm Wilson, was selected to play in the Carolinas All-State Classic with the top players from South Carolina and North Carolina
- ♦ Varsity Basketball players Laila Acox, Crosby Harris-James, Walyn Napper, and Malcolm Wilson were named in The State Newspaper's Midlands 60 players to Watch List for the 2018-2019 season.
- Ridge View Cheer Team finished 2nd at the 2018 Region Cheer Competition.
- ♦ Varsity Boys Basketball are State 4A Champions for a 2nd consecutive season.
- Football, wrestling, swim, and boys tennis teams experienced success in the playoffs. The football team made it to the 3rd round of the playoffs for the 2nd time in 3 years.
- ♦ Boys Soccer was undefeated in the Region (10-0) and was the #1 seed in the playoffs. Girls Soccer hosted a playoff game

Our collaborative efforts centered on improving literacy skills of students as well as providing Parent Universities, which educate parents on topics of their choice. 
