South Carolina Life Scholars

The Legislative Incentive for Future Excellence (LIFE) Scholarship is a merit-based scholarship administered by the financial aid office at each eligible public and independent institution in SC. Students attending a 4 year public school may receive up to \$5000 per year for four years.

The purpose of the LIFE Scholarship is to:

- Increase ACCESS to higher education
- Improve **EMPLOYMENT** of South Carolina's students
- Provide **INCENTIVES** for students to be better prepared for college
- Encourage students to **GRADUATE** from college on time

Ridge View opened its doors in 1995. The explosive growth of the Northeast area led to the opening of Blythewood High School in 2005. Dr. Marty Martin became principal in 2004. Since that time, Ridge View has continued to excel and to focus on student personalization. The highly successful Freshman Academy has been expanded to include sophomores. Now called the Blazer Academy, its success continues with among the lowest retention rates for freshmen in South Carolina. The Ridge View Scholars Academy, the AVID program, and the School for the Arts ensure all students are provided with an expanding personalized approach to learning. Excellence is the constant focus for academics, the arts, athletics, career and technology and student activities. Student advisories, a on-lunch system and additional tutorial and credit retrieval programs will continue the focus on providing a "better future" for each student attending Ridge View High School.

- Graduate in the top 30% of the graduating class

Personalization at Ridge View

Personalization continues to be the "Name of the Game" at Ridge View High School. Numerous initiatives, some in the planning stages, others underway, are designed to address more effectively the needs of every student at Ridge View: the medical magnet; the schools-within-a-school programs; Blazer Academy; the implementation of High Schools that Work practices; literacy across the curriculum; expansion of tutoring programs; NovaNET and ALEKS credit retrieval systems; the development of Career Clusters and Individual Graduation Plans; the personalized arena scheduling process; implementation of a one-lunch activities period; the Advisory program. All are intended to build upon Ridge View's successful past. Our aim will be to build each student's experiences towards a better future.

Schools-Within-A-School

- Achievement Via Individual Determination (AVID): This program, based on a national program, identifies students who have been performing at average levels, presents them with the tools to move successfully to high level courses, and prepares them for a four-year college.
- Institutes for Bio-Health Sciences and Allied Health Sciences: The BioHealth Sciences Magnet program at Ridge View High School, in conjunction with the nationally recognized Project Lead the Way Biomedical Sciences[™] program, offers highly achieving students a dynamic curriculum that uses real world experience and hands on learning. Students with interest in exploring the variety that health sciences offers will find PLTW's Biomedical Sciences[™] program to be a fantastic doorway for medical professions.
- **Ridge View Scholars Academy:** The Ridge View Scholars Academy is for highly motivated students who are interested in a curriculum with a strong interdisciplinary structure, incorporating humanities, science, math and the fine arts.
- School for the Arts: The School for the Arts is designed for students who have special talents and serious interest in the arts fields visual arts, band, orchestra, chorus, dance, creative writing, and drama.

Spotlight on "1 TWO 1"

The 1 TWO 1 computing initiative is an integral part of the <u>Richland Two Story</u>. Using technology, students will inquire and explore their world. Transformative technologies will ignite a joy of learning in our students and inspire them to become 21st century learners. . . Through personalized, authentic and collaborative experiences, our students will develop the skills to prepare them for a future that we can only imagine (Richland2.org).

Ridge View High School's 1TWO1 roll out began in January of 2012, when twenty five teachers received class sets of Chromebooks. Twenty six more teachers will begin using class sets of Chromebooks in August. Ridge View will have approximately 1300 devices for student use during the 2012-2013 school year. By the 2013-2014 school year, every student will have a device. Richland School District Two and Ridge View High School hope to accomplish the following goals with the 1TWO1 program:

- 1. *Improved Student Learning:* Through instructional strategies that apply best practices in teaching with technology and a variety of resources which support the curriculum, student learning will improve.
- 2. *Meaningful Student Engagement:* We will offer 1 TWO 1 computing to make school more engaging and relevant for our students and to support meaningful and more challenging work as described in the Richland Two Story.
- 3. **21st Century Skills:** We will ensure that students have high level 21st century skills which will prepare them for a successful future.
- 4. **Project and Problem-based Learning Opportunities:** Through personalized, authentic, and collaborative experiences, students will solve problems and demonstrate their learning through project-based activities.
- 5. *Equity of Access:* We will bridge the digital divide by providing all students with access to technology tools and resources for anytime, anywhere learning.
