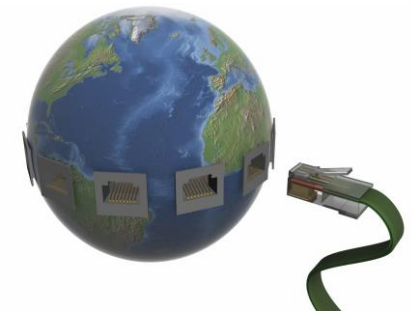

SIC ANNUAL GOALS

Test results for the 2014-2015 school year are considered baseline data because students in Grades 3 - 5 were tested for the first time in ELA, Reading, Writing, and Math using the ASPIRE assessment. The PASS assessment for Science and Social Studies was given to students in Grades 4 – 5 only, establishing new baseline data for these two subject areas as well. Because of the new assessments, schools were not given a new Absolute and Growth Rating this year.

Goal 1 – New baseline data for English, Reading, Writing, Mathematics, Science and Social Studies. Goal 1 cannot be measured this year.

Increase the frequency of technology integration and the number of students engaged with technology over the next 5 years.

Goal 2 – Improve school climate by the previous school year by targeting a 3% decrease in discipline referrals each year over the next 5 years.

Goal 3 – Increase teacher morale by 3% each year over the next 5 years.

Goal 4 – Increase teacher retention rate by 2% each year over the next 5 years.

Whitehall ranked 1st among the elementary Title I schools in overall student performance.

2015 ASPIRE assessment results rank Whitehall in the highest cluster with Concord, North Pointe, and Midway in for overall performance in ELA, Reading, Writing, and Math.

Whitehall ranked 1st among the elementary Title I Schools for PASS Assessment results in Science and Social Studies in the category of students scoring Met & Exemplary.

Technology Integration

Whitehall students work with technology each day. Putting technology in the hands of students aligns with our School Renewal Plan and our Global School Curriculum. 5th Grade has 1 to 1 technology with each student assigned a Chromebook. Grades 3 and 4 have 1 to 1 with each student having access to either a Chromebook or laptop. In addition, each grade level has a cart of 30 iPads used to support instruction. Students also have access to two computer labs. Students work on assignments in Google Classroom and use technology to practice skills, read books, conduct research, create projects, communicate via Skype, and take a variety of assessments that monitor student progress.
